

EDITORIAL COMMENTS

Who is this man Carroll Shelby and why is his picture on the front cover?

Well let's answer the second part first. Why not. the name after all is <u>SHELBY LIFE</u>. The picture was taken at SAAC VIII. Here in Dearborn, Michigan this past July many pictures were taken of him.

Who he is, now that's rather complex. He was a racing car driver in the '50s'. He built Cobras and Shelby Mustangs in the '60s'. Sold chili, parts, and wheels in the '70s'.

But the time is now. He is still the subject of hero-worship in SAAC but, at the national conventions of the past he was given a standing ovation when he rose to speak and again when he finished. When he got up to give his address at this year's main event everyone stood and applauded.

What was in his words that caused some to remain seated at the end of his speach? Maybe it was the words of treason in the hometown of Henry Ford-Shelby <u>Dodge</u> Charger. Seems he suggested that there was room for other performance cars besides those from Ford.

Maybe in other parts of the country, but the Motor City Region has baulked at the very idea. Many members are employed by Ford Motor Company. Some were Ford enthuiasts before the Cobra was made others became interested in the club and its activities owning cars built after the last Shelby was sold.

If your expecting to find the answer here-well you won't.

It's a very personnal thing whether it's loyalty to Mr. Shelby,
the cars from Shelby American, the Ford Motor Company and/or it's
cars, or performance vehicles in general.

SAAC will continue, SAAC-MCR will continue, FoMoCo will continue.Carroll Shelby will have a long and fruitful life, God willing. SDAC who knows? SDAC-MCR who cares? We're not sure.

Dear John:

In response to your question regarding Shelby Chargers and the "official SAAC policy" about letting them into SAAC meets, it is this:

1) SAAC is dedicated to the enjoyment, care, history and preservation of the cars from Shelby American. Those cars essentially stopped being build and sold in 1970. Because many SAAC members also have other types of Ford performance vehicles, SAAC has expanded to include these cars; however, the basic thrust of the club is still the cars that Carroll Shelby built between 1961 and 1970.

2) SAAC Regions are autonomous and should adhere to the desires and needs of their members. That would include allowing or disallowing any specific non-Shelby type of cars at the meets they sponsor.

I would think that at least three things be taken into consideration during a discussion of this subject.

- 1) Are meets held for the members of a region or for a particular type of car (or cars)? What will be the response to a regional and national SAAC member who attends a meet with any non-Shelby American car (ie. Bricklin, Grand Sport Corvette, Lola T-70, Ferrari, Shelby Charger, etc?). It should be realized that not everyone is able to own a Shelby American car but many are just as enthusiastic as owners. Some members may be in the process of exchanging their non-Shelby for a Shelby or Cobra and still want to feel like a participant as opposed to a spectator so they want to bring whatever car they have.
- 2) If a non-Shelby owner wishes to attend as a participant rather than a spectator, what are his chances of joining the organization (either regional or national) if he is specifically excluded?
- 3) The more registrations you have at a meet, the more expenses you will be able to cover. That translates to "more" or "better" in whatever categories the regional leaders wish

(ie. bigger or better trophies, dash plaques, registration packets or materials, etc.) or a larger regional treasury.

If you are worried about setting a precident by allowing these cars and then suddenly finding a hundred of them at next year's meet - demanding classes, trophies, etc. that is one of the primary reasons why the Shelby Dodge Automobile Club was started. We didn't want that to happen to SAAC. We think that as the SDAC grows, there will be fewer and fewer Shelby Chryslers at SAAC meets because they will have meets of their own. But we also felt that there would be nothing wrong with allowing these cars and their owners to participate in SAAC meets - as long as they realized that the club exists primarily for the Shelby American cars.


It would be both foolish and arrogant for us to attempt to dictate to regions. All we ask is that you do what is in the best interests of SAAC and its members. SAAC was never intended to be an elitist organization. That is why it was specifically open to enthusiasts as opposed to owners only. There are a lot of "future owners" out there... and some of them might be driving Shelby Chargers.

I hope this provides some material fos discussion. I would appreciate knowing what your region decides and the rationale behind their decision.

MEETING MINUTES

Thursday June 2, 1983. Meeting called to order at 7:30 pm.

<u>T-shirt</u> orders were verified for pickup by members after the meeting.

National Rep./Editor's Report: Utica Test Track would be used for the national convention. Michigan International Speedway was not obtainable for a high speed event. The Utica Test Track would be cleaned and inspected by the Carnival of Cars event, June 4th & 5th.

"The Shelby Life" M.C.R. Newsletter would be out sometime in the month of June with some pictures and articles from Show & Go VIII.

Show & Go VIII Review: Dale Rabe told the members that Show & Go VIII was sucessful and there was a commendable profit for the club. Swap meet participants advised that there were considerable profits for them. Lee Swonder told the members that if rain insurance would have been secured for the show, we would have been able to collect. Tom Greene said that Gary Olson's catering was very pleased with the turnout at the show and he made a profit. A suggestion was made to have him make a contribution toward rain insurance for next years event. Mark Bernard of the Mustang Club of Michigan commented that 15 cars showed up for the Show & Go and that they were pleased with the quality of the trophies. Discussion was brought up as to why there were no plaques on the trophies. Plaques may be ordered for next years' event using laser photography to reduce overall costs.

Mesdowbrook Mall Car Show would be under security from 11:00 on. Mall officials have requested two representatives from the club to organize and keep an eye on the cars. A representative would also be needed at an information booth to distribute local and national membership forms and explain

A worker rotation schedule is needed for the weekend and would be set up at the July membership meeting. A wall near the cars would have to be located to display posters and pictures. M.C.R. t-shirts may be sold at the show if mall officials will allow.

<u>T-shirts</u>: Discussion was brought whether special SAAC-8 t±shirts would be printed for the national or would we stay with the current transfer. Dale Rabe said that with the limited time before the national, it would be impossible to revise our current screen. Discussion was made to put our current transfer on the back of the shirts and print S.A.A.C.-8/Dearborn '83 on the front in small lettering. Motor City Region would be blocked out of our engine transfer to make the shirt appealing to out of state members. A motion was made and seconded to order 150 shirts ,75 blue and 75 white, at the new discussed configuration if feasible. A scaled down logo transfer was passed around by Dale for membership approval. It would be used for 3" patches. Patches will be ordered if printer approves of the size and transfer.



MEETING MINUTES

Thursday July 7, 1983. Meeting called to order at 7:15 pm.

Editorial Comments: No newsletter was printed in June. There will now be a contributing editor to the newsletter. His name is Rick Jones. He will be writing about the restoration of his 66 Shelby.

<u>National Convention</u>: Members were pleased that Carroll Shelby attended the National although he acted as a representative of Chrysler Corporation.

The Motor City Region made an excellent showing at the National taking 1st & 2nd Pantera, 3rd in 69 GT-500 class, 1st place 1970 Shelby, and best overall Shelby at the show.

Tom Greene commented that he thought SAAC 8 was very well run. Mike Sedlak indicated that the parts swap was a little disorganized. Jeff Burgy responded that with the number of vendors attending it was impossible to keep them all organized and in their respective places.

Dale Rabe praised Jeff Burgy for all his work at the national. Jeff commented that he would have liked to have had more control of the convention from the national reps. and Ford. Jeff then thanked local members for their participation at the national.

Clay Stroup asked Jeff when we can expect another National Convention in Dearborn. Jeff replied probably in 1986. Next year would be at Riverside California and in 1985 back to Great Gorge, New Jersey.

Rich Tweedle would show video from Milan Dragway and the Utica Test Track event at Meadowbrook Mall the weekend of July 8,9,&10. Mall hours are from 9am to 8pm Friday and Saturday and 12 to 5 on Sunday. Security will be on duty during mall hours to watch cars. Shelby cars from every year will be represented with also some other non Shelby special

The high speed event at Utica was excellent except for slow running cars that were clogging up the main lanes.

Meadowbrook Mall Car Show: Publicity for the show is being handled by the mall with printed flyers and posters.

A signup sheet was passed around by Tom Greene for car sitting at the show, security would concentrate on watching the cars but would be in charge of the whole mall. Dale Rabe would bring out membership applications Thrusday evening.

<u>National Representative</u>: John Guyer reminded the local members of the Toronto meet on Labor Day weekend. John would bring out club literature to Meadowbrook.

Membership Meeting: The monthly membership meeting would be moved to Mama Mia's Restaurant beginning the first Thrusday in August. Mama Mia's is located on Plymouth Road 3 blocks west of Inkster. The meeting would be scheduled for 7:00 pm. with a hopeful start time of 7:15 pm. The club will furnish 2 large pizzas and the restaurant will run individual tabs for everything else.

<u>T-shirts</u>: About 50% of S.A.A.C. 8 t-shirts were sold at the national. Some members t-shirts are still on hold for payment.

There is a \$1400 bill for the current stock of shirts. We sold about \$600 worth of shirts at the national. A stand would be set up at Meadowbrook Mall to sell leftover shirts. If the club is unable to liquidate the shirts we have in stock after the Meadowbrook Mall show an ad would be published in the Shelby American for members missing the national.

Show & Go VIII Update: Dale Rabe commented that after Show & Go VIII, all cleaning up had to be done by Rich Tweedle, Grant Martin, and himself who were not assigned to do it. The Show director should be advised of this.

Storage: Dale Rabe suggested that a storage unit should be rented by the club as a central location to hold all club supplies(signs, stantions, etc.) for future shows. Greg Koss would be contacted for the use of one of his barns to keep costs down.

AS AN EARLY MODEL Must. OWNER YOU MAY, FROM TIME TO TIME, REQUIRE REPLACE-MENT PARTS FOR YOUR VEHICLE. DEPENDING ON HOW YOU WISH TO PURCHASE YOUR PARTS, IE, NEW THRU A DEALER, USED FROM A SALVAGE YARD OR NEW/USED WHILE ATTENDING A SWAP MEET, THERE MAY BE SOME CONFUSSION OVER THE PART NUMBERS AND CASTING NUMBERS YOU ENCOUNTER. BEING ABLE TO UNDERSTAND THE FOMOCO PARTS NUMBERING SYSTEM SHOULD RELIEVE SOME OF THE CONFUSSION AND ALLOW YOU TO BE REASONABLY CERTAIN THAT YOUR BUYING THE RIGHT PART.

THE FOMOCO PARTS NUMBERING SYSTEM, AS WE KNOW IT TODAY, WAS ESTABLISHED DURING THE 1940'S DECADE. AT FIRST GLANCE ALL THE LETTERS AND NUMBERS APPEAR TO BE COMPLICATED, BUT AFTER CAREFUL REVIEW THEIR REALLY VERY FUNCTIONAL. LETS TAKE A TYPICAL PART NUMBER AND EXAMINE IT TO SEE WHAT EVERY THING MEANS. THEY ARE SET UP IN TWO GROUPS PLUS A SUFFIX.

THE FIRST FOUR CHARACTERS CONTAIN INFORMATION ON THE ORIGINAL RELEASE DATE OF PART, WHICH VEHICLE LINE IT WAS DESIGNED FOR, AND WHERE THE PART IS KEPT FOR WAREHOUSING. IN SOME CASES IT WILL ALSO DESIGNATE THAT THE PART WAS DESIGNED FOR OFF-ROAD USAGE ONLY.

GROUP 2

IN ANY CASE, GROUP 2 DE-SIGNATES THE GENERAL TYPE OF PART OR COMPONENT SUCH AS A CYLINDER HEAD (6049), ENGINE BLOCK (6010), OR INTAKE MANIFOLD (9424), ETC. ON PARTS THAT HAVE A LEFT OR RIGHT DESIGNATION, THE LAST DIGIT WILL BE ODD FOR A LEFT HAND PART AND EVEN FOR A RIGHT HAND PART. LEFT HAND OR RIGHT HAND IS DETERMINED BY LOOKING AT THE VEHICLE FROM THE REAR. LEFT BEING LEFT AND RIGHT BEING RIGHT.

SUFFIX

THE SINGLE-CHARACTER SUFFIX AT THE END OF THE PART NUMBER IS AN ALPHABETICAL CODE DESIGNATING THE BLUEPRINT VERSION OF THE ORIGINAL DESIGN. FOR EXAMPLE, A SUFFIX "A" WAS THE OGIGINAL DESIGN, A "C" SUFFIX WOULD INDICATE THAT THE PART IS THE THIRD REVISION, AND A "E" SUFFIX WOULD INDICATE THE FIFTH REVISION.





Hi - I'm Tom Greene.



Resident rebuilds Shelby to capture national honor

In 1966 O.J. Simpson wasn't filming rent-a-car commercials, but he could have flown through airports in Hertz' Shelby Mustang rentals.

Known then as the GT350H, the sleek black and gold cars were Ford Mustangs customized for Hertz by performance enthusiast Carroll Shelby.

The cars, now simply called Shelbys, are pure power and performance — possibly the princes in the muscle car kingdom.

One glance at Rick Jones' 1966 Shelby reveals a car made in a time when V8s and street racing were the rule rather than exception. The air scoops, hood locks, mag wheels and white-letter tires are subtle reminders that this car can travel at speeds in excess of 100 mph.

However Jones, a Plymouth resident, rebuilt his Shelby for show competition rather than street racing.

His efforts paid off earlier this month in a first place at the National Shelby Club's car judging at the Dearborn Hyatt Regency. The judging was part of a three-day Shelby convention.

"I stripped the car right down to the bare metal and built it from the ground up. It's all original, except for the tires," said Jones, a Ford Motor Co. engineer.

WHILE REBUILDING the car, Jones spent hours researching how it was built and what parts were used. Along the way he learned the history of the '66 Shelby.

The first Shelbys were built in 1965.

It was Shelby's attempt to prove Americans could build production racing cars which could compete with European models such as the Jaguar.

"The '65s are all out racing cars. They could blow any car off the road. They are extremely rare now," Jones

In 1966 Shelby went to the Hertz Corporation hoping to sell them a few hundred customized cars. Apparently they were impressed, Hertz bought 935 Shelbys to rent through its Hertz Sports Car Club.

The Hertz pamphlet which pictured the cars, only offered in black and gold, now are worth \$100, Jones said.

The '66 Shelbys sold for \$3,500. Today, a car like Jones' can sell for \$18,000 to \$21,000.

In the car judging Jones' Shelby received 290 points out of a possible 300.

"They took a few points off because they found some polish I left on the car somewhere. I also got a few points off because I have a little dent in the passenger door," he said.

However, to a layman the car looks flawless. On the outside the paint is shined to a mirror-like finish. On the inside the upholstery is spotless, as is

the dash containing various meters and gauges.

Under the hood, the 289-cubic inch Cobra engine is polished, cleaned and painted. Sitting below the high-rise chrome air filter are head covers proudly displaying the Ford name.

"When I drive it I become a basket case, so it's really not fun. When I go out for a drive, by the time I get home I'm a nervous wreck," he

On one of his first trips out after rebuilding the car, Jones said he learned his lesson.

"I pulled the car out to do some cleaning in the garage. I decided I would go ahead and take it around the block," he recalled.

"I went dwon to Kellogg Park. When I got there I thought to myself that Sheldon Road was a lot smoother, so I headed for Sheldon," he said.

After getting on Sheldon, Jones decided to take the car on M-14, since he never drove it on the expressway.

"As I got onto the expressway, I sort of got on it and the engine really kicked in. I shot out and there, sitting on the side, was a state police car."

As the police car pulled out, Jones didn't worry about getting a ticket as much as he did about not having his driver's license with him.

"All I had visions of was the boys from Mayflower Towing," he chuckled.

"Luckily the cops didn't get me, they went on around and got some other people. I drove the car home and said, 'Never again.' Now I take shorter trips."
